CRITERIA FOR AWARDS

Basic Principles

- 1. Coaches/directors/teachers in charge nominate pupils for awards. The awards committee makes the final decision.
- 2. Learners are allowed to hand in CV's for external commitments at the end of Term 1 and the end of Term 3. All awards are at the discretion of the awards committee, using the point system.
- 3. There are times when this document does not provide adequately specific criteria. The following very loose set of analogies might be helpful in such cases:
- Hard to beat in the whole country. (74+points)
- Hard to beat at Eastern Cape provincial level. (67+points)
- Hard to beat at metropolitan level. (62+ points)
- Hard to beat at school level. (60+ points)
- 4. Awards are only given to pupils with a minimum of 80% attendance.
 - Sport (Matches and practices)
 - Leadership and service (Committee meetings as well as activities/projects)

AWARDS CRITERIA

School awards are offered to those pupils who perform with excellence in school sports, culture, service, leadership and Jewish Life. Their participation must model sound Theodor Herzl values: Respect, Compassion, Accountability, Integrity and Social responsibility.

No award is automatic. If a candidate has met the minimum criteria for an award, the candidate is then considered by the committee. All candidates and parents have the responsibility to familiarise themselves with the awards criteria.

Should a pupil need clarification on a decision made by the committee, an appointment must be made with the Chairperson of the Awards Committee, who will clarify and investigate the matter further in consultation with the Committee.

Activities which qualify for Awards and Recognition at the Extra Mural awards:

- 1. Jewish Life
- 2. Culture
- 3. Sport
- 4. Leadership
- 5. Service

Awards and Points Allocations:

1. MERIT:70-79 pointsAll Grades2. COLOURS:80-89 pointsAll Grades3. HONOURS:90 points and aboveAll Grades

Honours may also be awarded to a pupil in Grade 11 and 12 who has been awarded three Colours awards in any category during his or her High School career. He/She is automatically considered for an Honours blazer at the discretion of the awards committee as the criteria for an Honours blazer would have been met. THIS AWARD WILL FALL UNDER SERVICE TO SCHOOL.

CALCULATION OF AWARDS

Awards are calculated according to three categories:

- 1. Points allocated according to the level of representation of a particular activity. (Achievement in the activity)
- 2. Theodor Herzl School values and role-modelling component (score out of 50 that is reduced to a score out of 10)
- 3. Years' of service or involvement (score that is multiplied by 3).

2. THEODOR HERZL VALUES AND ROLE MODELLING COMPONENT (score out of 50 that is reduced to a score out of 10)

What are we looking for? Respect, kindness, honesty, courage, perseverance, self-discipline, compassion, generosity, dependability, ability to inspire/lead others.

Teachers, supervisors, school management as well as sport coaches all assess this category.

3. YEARS OF SERVICE

Pupils years of service or involvement in activities contributes to the overall point score. One year is equivalent to 3 points.

LEADERSHIP

• Major Events/Projects

Definition:

- 1. Immediate and long-term social and cultural benefit to the school.
- 2. Attracts a significant number of participants
- 3. Generates significant local media coverage
- 4. Is sustainable (puts in place structure to ensure event/project sustainability)

Examples: (Sporting/Academic/ Cultural events or activities.)

• Middle-Level Events/Projects

Definition:

- 1. Attracts significant number of school participants.
- 2. Has a large profile inside of the school.
- 3. Is sustainable or is a significant once off event.

Examples: (Sporting/Academic/ Cultural events or activities: Gala, Miss and Mr THS, Open day)

• Minor Event

Definition:

- 1. Attracts a fair number of school participants
- 2. May be a once-off event

Examples: (Inviting a guest speaker to the school, initiating a fundraiser (limited in input)
