From the Pre-Primary School, to the other end of the spectrum – the Primary and High School, where the notion of the skill/ability to solve problems, think creatively, all the while collaborating, are certainly skills needed by the next generation. The IEB (Independent Examination Board) has created many opportunities for these skills to be honed. A pilot study by the IEB late last year, in which our students participated, saw our students work collaboratively and nationally with other school pupils on a problem-solving situation involving the scope of Artificial Intelligence (AI) in education. This included research from the student as well as the staff perspective. This year, our students are involved in a similar research topic concerning the world of AI. It is again a national "think-tank" and one which will reinforce the need to "think out of the proverbial box," work collaboratively and be creative and imaginative in solving the issues at hand.

Being part of the IEB has more than distinct advantages (apart from being a rigorous assessment body). Internationally accredited, its assessment levels, workshops for our students (and staff) encourage and reinforce creative and critical thinking. Our schools being part of the IEB is of vital importance on so many levels.

Staff development is also a feature of the IEB and all of our High School staff are attending either regional or national conferences in the next three weeks, hosted by the IEB. Getting to grips with the national curriculum, while establishing collegial networks and receiving feedback from national examiners of matric final examinations, these opportunities are more than necessary and helpful.

On the home front, and as reflected on our social media pages, our High School Inter House Gala took place this past Friday. There is talent aplenty. With the High School Inter House Athletics taking place this Thursday 1 February, and our touring team consisting of our Boy's Cricket Team, boys' and girls' Tennis teams and our Basketball teams all in action this week, it certainly is a busy but exciting week.

I am looking forward to visiting the Primary School this morning, where, at a symbolic ceremony, each Grade 7 child officially takes on the role of "big brother/sister and mentor" for each incoming Grade 1 child. Mentoring, nurturing and caring is at the heart of what we strive to achieve on every level in our respective schools.

Our recent *Tu Bishvat* assembly on Thursday reflected the heart of Theodor Herzl Schools once again. The message of Tu B'Shvat is that although the fruit have not yet grown, the process which creates them has begun! For people, our fruits are our deeds and achievements – and they too have their origin.

I congratulate *Katie Ferrant* who was awarded the Trophy for Best Supporting Actress at PEMADS's production of Goldilocks and the 3 bears. It is a significant achievement.
