I have often mentioned resilience and its importance in our children's/students' lives at school or in the wider world. We learn these lessons at school...and at home. Closely aligned to resilience and which is a common challenge that can often hinder our progress and well-being is: the danger of <u>underestimating one's own ability</u> and potential.

I have loved watching our High School Quiz team participate in the inter-schools Herald on the Go Quiz competition. From being a team that, to a degree, doubted their own expertise and underestimated their ability, they are now semi-finalists, the first time Theodor Herzl School has been in this position in many years...if ever! I am so proud of them. Eric Greltens's quote captures our Quiz team's performance perfectly – they have endured round after round, beating favoured teams, but they have had "direction" – the end destination in mind - to win the title. The Semi-Finals and Finals will take place in the week ahead. I wish them and Mrs Venter, who has supported, coached and guided the team, every success.

We live in a world that often highlights perfection and effortless success, leading many of us to compare ourselves unfavorably to others. It comes in different forms: a child/student hesitant to raise their hand in class, even when they know the answer, or a talented individual shying away from a new challenge (be it in or outside the classroom) because they doubt their capacity to succeed.

Unwittingly, as teachers and parents, we may contribute to and be part of the "problem". In trying to remove the problem, obstacle or challenge a child/student may be facing, we deprive the child of experiencing the feeling of "success" and achievement, of having a

"squirt of dopamine." Although a seemingly controversial sentiment, we can sometimes be "stealing" our child's access to the much-needed dopamine by unintentionally eliminating the problems a child faces. As adults, we have the "dopamine rush" as we feel that we have solved the problem for the child (and we feel good about ourselves), but what about the child? Where is their satisfaction in having "battled" and persevered? Dopamine, a neurotransmitter and hormone, is crucial in various bodily functions, including movement, learning, memory, mood and motivation. It is often referred to as the "feel-good" hormone, as it is associated with feelings of pleasure, reward and satisfaction.

It is crucial for our children/students at Theodor Herzl Schools (from pre-primary to High School) to discover and be reminded <u>that true growth happens when we step outside our comfort zones and discover what we're truly made of</u>. As teachers, parents/guardians, we need to help them in this regard.

Knowing when to intervene and help and when to step back and away is always a fine line. With our high school students fully involved in exam mode, the need for one to "step aside" is realised even more keenly!

On a different tack, I have been intrigued and excited to see our Primary School children learning about the Chinese culture as they partner up with Huancheng Primary School in Jinhua Province, China. It is all about finding opportunities to collaborate and celebrate the richness of one's respective cultures. Good learning moments at every turn at Theodor Herzl School

We certainly live in an "interesting" world, and the following article reinforces this.
